Estuaries provide a critical habitat for resident bottlenose dolphin communities. With increasing pressures from human activity, the future health and survival of these dolphin communities remains unknown.

Indo-Pacific bottlenose dolphins

(*Tursiops aduncus*) are the most common species of dolphin found in the Gold Coast & are globally listed as **Near Threatened**.

The Gold Coast-Broadwater estuary is an important habitat for the local dolphin population. This population consists of long-term residents who regularly travel into the estuary for crucial activities including feeding, resting and socialising.

Did you know?

Individual dolphins can be identified by the unique patterns of notches and scars on their dorsal fin!


